50 Years of Caring

For 50 years, Northern Counties Health Care has been dedicated to improving the health and well-being of the people and communities of Vermont's Northeast Kingdom. Founded in 1976 as Vermont's first Federally Qualified Health Center, NCHC was built on a simple belief: everyone deserves access to compassionate, high-quality healthcare close to home.

What began with a vision to improve access to healthcare in one of Vermont's most rural regions — and a staff of just two employees — has grown into a comprehensive healthcare system providing primary care, dental care, behavioral health, home health, hospice, walk-in care, and a wide range of care coordination and patient support services throughout the Northeast Kingdom.

Over the past five decades, we have remained committed to listening to our patients and the communities we serve. Their needs have shaped our growth, guided the services we provide, and inspired us to continually expand access,



embrace innovation, and deliver care in new and meaningful ways.

Today, Northern Counties Health Care proudly serves approximately 40% of the residents of the Northeast Kingdom, providing care to thousands of individuals and families each year. As we celebrate this milestone, we remain committed to ensuring that everyone has access to the care they need, regardless of their ability to pay, while continuing to build a healthier future for our communities.

A Personal Reflection on NCHC's Beginnings

When I came to the Northeast Kingdom in the early 1970s, it was one of Vermont's most medically underserved regions. Outside of St. Johnsbury and Newport, many communities had lost their local physicians to retirement or death, with no one to replace them.

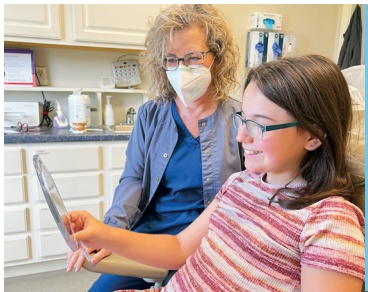
As part of a two-person office tasked with improving health care in the region, I discovered the Community Health Center model—federally funded practices providing care to everyone, regardless of ability to pay, and guided by community members themselves.

Residents in Hardwick and Island Pond embraced this vision. Thanks to their leadership and commitment, Northern Counties Health Care received Vermont's first Community Health Center funding in 1976.

From Humble Beginnings to a Trusted Community Partner



1976 Northern Counties Health Care is founded as Vermont's first Community Health Center, providing high-quality, compassionate healthcare throughout the Northeast Kingdom

1977 Greensboro Health Center (which was to become the Hardwick Area Health Center) and Island Pond Health Center open

1979 Danville Health Center became NCHC's third health care center.

1980 Concord Health Center opens, expanding access to healthcare to southern Essex County.

1988 Northern Counties Health Care welcomes Caledonia Home Health Care & Hospice, adding home health, hospice, and palliative care services.

2001 Northern Counties Dental Center in Hardwick opens, expanding dental access

2003 St. Johnsbury Family Health Center (now known as St. Johnsbury Community Health Center) joined Northern Counties Health Care.

2007 Northern Counties Health Care is recognized as Vermont's first Patient Centered Medical Home (PCMH).

2017 Orleans Dental Center opens

2020 Northern Express Care opens in St. Johnsbury, providing convenient walk-in care for the community.

2022 Northern Express Care opens in Newport

In just one year, volunteers and staff secured facilities, hired four physicians, equipped two medical practices, achieved Medicare and Medicaid certification, and opened a dental practice in Island Pond—one of the first community health centers in the nation to offer dental care.

Those first two health centers laid the foundation for everything that followed. Over the past 50 years, NCHC has continued to grow, expanding services and reaching more communities while staying true to the vision that inspired its beginnings.

As its founding Executive Director for 30 years, I am proud of what NCHC became—and I know the work is not done. As long as health care needs exist, NCHC will continue to respond, guided by the same commitment to community-centered care that shaped its first days. Here's to another 50 years of caring for the Kingdom!

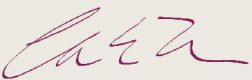

ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, I am pleased to share this annual financial update for Northern Counties Health Care for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2026. As a Federally Qualified Health Center, our financial stewardship is inseparable from our mission: ensuring that high-quality, affordable, and compassionate care remain available to the people and communities of the Northeast Kingdom.

For the fiscal year ended March 31, 2026, NCHC reported operating revenue of \$32,487,906, grants and contributions revenue of \$4,828,033, and other revenue of \$2,693,061, which included the Employee Retention Credit. Operating expenses totaled \$38,058,424, resulting in an annual gain of \$1,950,576. These results reflect both the ongoing challenges facing rural health care and the strength of NCHC's commitment to the community. Every dollar entrusted to the organization supports access to primary care, dental care, behavioral health services, enabling services, home health, and hospice care for individuals and families who may otherwise face significant barriers to receiving care.

Strong financial oversight allows NCHC to remain responsive, resilient, and mission focused. The organization continues to manage resources carefully, monitor operating performance, and make thoughtful decisions that support long-term sustainability while preserving access for patients regardless of insurance status, income, or ability to pay.

The impact of this work is seen throughout the communities we serve: in patients who can receive care close to home, families who have access to dental and behavioral health services, individuals supported through care coordination and outreach, and neighbors who can rely on home-based and end-of-life care when they need it most. NCHC's financial health is not simply measured in numbers; it is measured in the access, trust, and continuity of care we help make possible.

I would like to thank NCHC's leadership, staff, providers, community partners, and Board members for their continued dedication to our mission. Their work ensures that NCHC remains a trusted safety net and a vital community resource. As Treasurer, I am grateful for the opportunity to support an organization whose financial resources are managed with care and directed toward meaningful community impact.

Our interdisciplinary team — including nurses, hospice aides, social workers, chaplain care, volunteers, and providers — walks beside patients and families every step of the way, offering expert care and compassionate support when it matters most.

CHHC's commitment to excellence was recently recognized with a 5-Star Patient Experience Rating from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) — the highest rating possible in patient experience. Based on direct feedback from patients and families, this distinction reflects the compassion, responsiveness, and quality of care our team delivers every day.

More than a rating, this recognition represents the trust our community places in us and the meaningful impact our staff has in the lives of those we serve. We are proud to provide care with compassion, excellence, and heart.

COMMUNITY STORIES

Every day, Northern Counties Health Care team members have the privilege of walking alongside patients through some of life’s greatest challenges and milestones. While every journey is unique, each reflects the impact that compassionate, community-centered care can have on individuals and families throughout the Northeast Kingdom.

Finding Support Through Grief

After the unexpected loss of her son, a woman in her 70s was referred for counseling support. Through a trusting relationship developed with one of NCHC’s Peer Support Workers, she found a safe space to share her emotions and process her grief. Struggling with uncertainty and feelings of guilt, she received reassurance that grief has no timeline and that healing looks different for everyone.

With ongoing support and encouragement, she took an important step toward healing by visiting her son’s home to say goodbye. The experience brought a sense of peace and closure she had been seeking. Today, she continues her journey one day at a time, supported by a care team that meets her with empathy, patience, and understanding.

Achieving Health Goals

After being diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes, one patient partnered with NCHC’s Care Coordination Team to take control of their health. Through healthier eating, increased physical activity, medication support, and ongoing guidance from their care team, they reduced their A1C from 7.3% to 5.4%, lost nearly 55 pounds, and made significant progress toward quitting smoking.

Their journey demonstrates how personalized care, education, and support can empower patients to make lasting lifestyle changes and achieve meaningful improvements in their overall health and well-being.

Connecting Families to Care

When a family relocating to Vermont needed help navigating healthcare coverage, NCHC’s Vermont Health Connect Assister stepped in. Within days, the family was enrolled in Medicaid coverage and connected with additional resources, including 3SquaresVT and WIC. By helping families access healthcare and essential supports, NCHC ensures that community members can focus on building healthy, stable lives in their new home.

Whether providing clinical care, emotional support, or connections to community resources, NCHC remains committed to helping individuals and families thrive — continuing a tradition of care that has strengthened the Northeast Kingdom for 50 years.

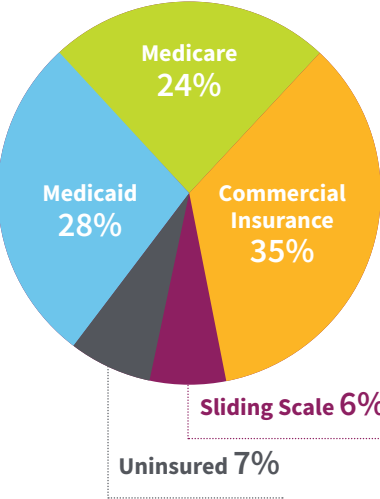

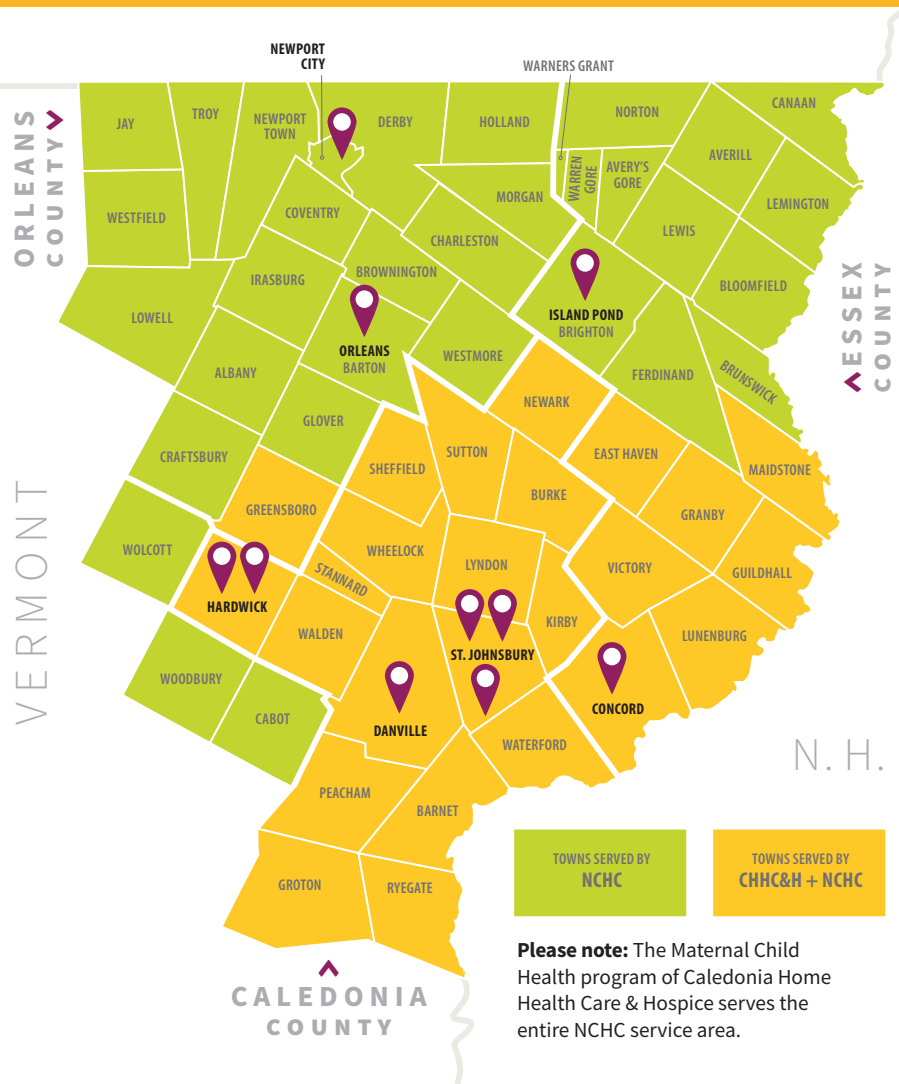
